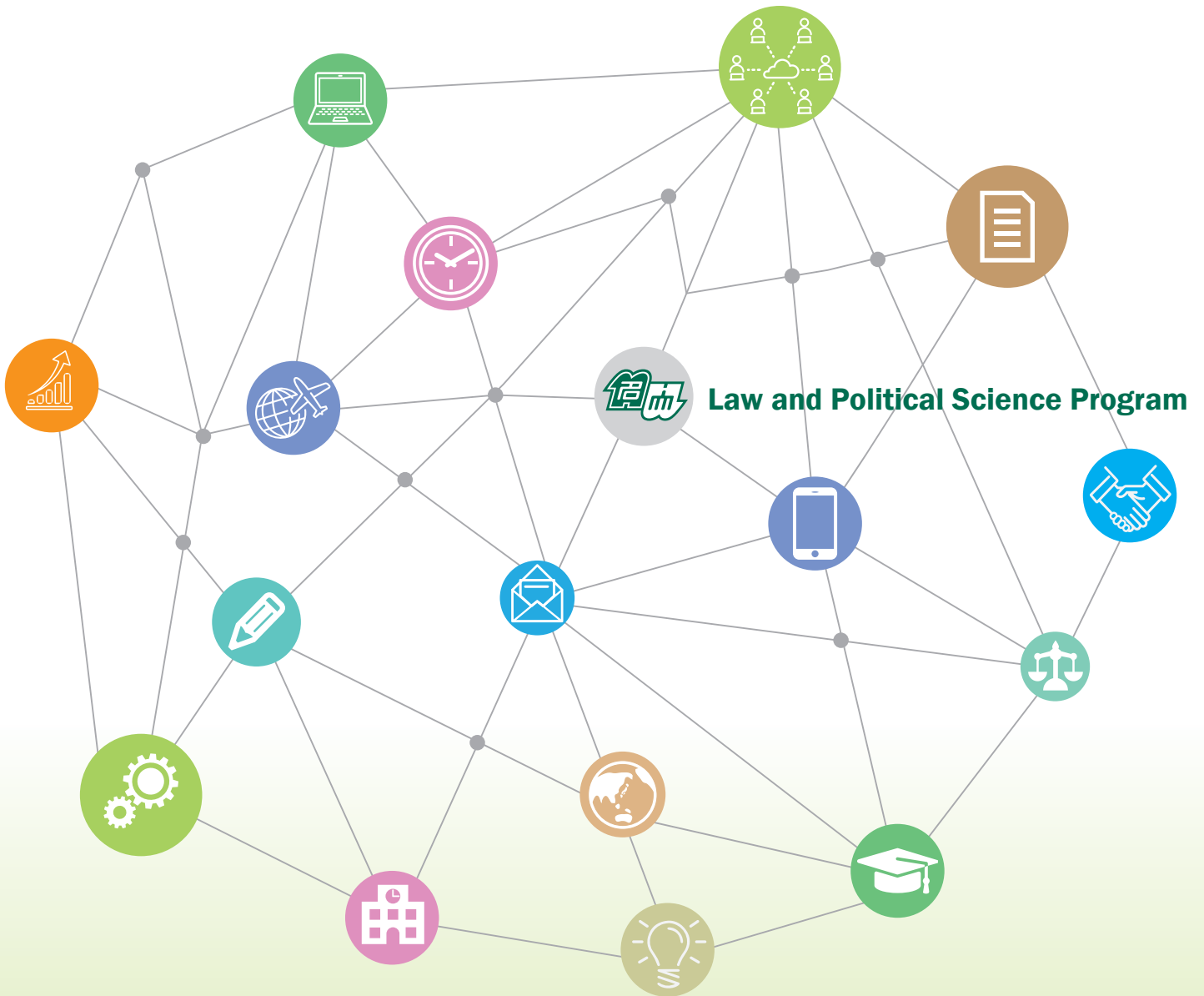

Degree programs are administered in both English and Japanese, with English language degrees available at the undergraduate, master's and PhD levels. The Faculty of Law remains active in international research, hosting visiting scholars from across the world, sponsoring conferences and events, and regularly publishing in top-rated academic journals.

Faculty

The Nagoya University Faculty of Law currently has approximately 50 full time faculty teaching and engaging in a wide range of legal and political science research. Legal research fields include comparative, administrative, civil and criminal laws, as well as more specific fields such as competition and banking law, corporate, intellectual property and social security law. Political science research includes areas such as public policy, international relations, comparative politics, public administration, political philosophy and theory, and political history.

Undergraduate Education

The School of Law has provided comprehensive four-year undergraduate programs with a revitalized curriculum since 2004, offering courses in both basic and specialized subjects. Nagoya University also offers exchange programs, where undergraduates and graduate students from partner universities abroad can study for four to twelve months in Nagoya.

Global 30 International Social Sciences Program

The Global 30 (G30) International Social Sciences Program includes political science, law, economics, business administration, and information science courses, taught entirely in English. G30 curriculum covers comparative studies of Asian societies, corporate theory, international negotiation, international law, development economics, economic integration, global management as well as environmental issues. The program emphasizes the study of the political, legal, and economic systems of modern Japan. Upon selecting their major, students can receive specific guidance from professors in their chosen discipline. Class sizes are typically small, giving students close access to university professors.

The Center for Asian Legal Exchange (CALE)

Established on April 1, 2000 by the Nagoya University Faculty of Law, the Center for Asian Legal Exchange (CALE) aims to promote international cooperation and research on Asian law and politics, and to serve as a nucleus for the gathering and distributing of information relating to Asian legal and political systems. CALE has three main missions: to research the laws and legal systems of other Asian countries, to support legal assistance in Asia, and to train and develop human resources in Japan. To help achieve these missions, and in cooperation with local host universities, CALE operates eight joint research and education centers in Asia including Uzbekistan, Mongolia, Hanoi and Ho Chi Minh City in Vietnam, Cambodia, Myanmar, Indonesia and Laos.

Exchange Program

The Nagoya University Program for Academic Exchange (NUPACE) is a short-term student exchange program, through which international students enrolled at any of Nagoya University's partner institutions around the world are given the opportunity to study in Japan for four to twelve months, often earning course credit to apply toward their degree at their home university.

Graduate Education – Master's and PhD



Master's – Comparative Law LLM

The Comparative Law LLM aims to further the education of overseas legal professionals, policymakers, civil servants and legal educators. Coming mainly from Asian countries, graduates from this program are expected to apply their knowledge and make a strong contribution to their home country. Successful students are granted the degree of Master of Laws (Comparative Law). This program can be pursued in English or Japanese.

PhD – Comparative Law LLD

With English as the primary medium of research and instruction, the Comparative Law LLD targets overseas students, mainly from Asian countries, who have completed a master's program and demonstrated ability in the academic and practical study of law or politics. Writing a dissertation is a core part of the program, where the dissertation is expected to contribute to the resolution of theoretical and practical issues for the target country.

Asian Satellite Campuses Institute(ASCI) – Transnational Doctoral Program

The Transnational Doctoral Program for Leading Professionals in Asian Countries is a distance education initiative, built upon the Nagoya University Faculty of Law's considerable experience with human resource development in support of legal and judicial reform in Asian countries. The program currently has students studying law and political science from Cambodia, Laos, Mongolia, Uzbekistan and Vietnam. The Transnational Doctoral Program is tailored to address the needs of officials in the legislative, administrative and judicial sectors, as well as university faculty in the fields of law and political science, with English as the primary language of research and communication.

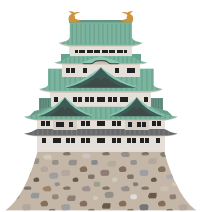

Nagoya city info

The city of Nagoya is located in the central Japan region, between Tokyo and Kyoto. Nagoya is Japan's fourth largest city, with a population of about 9.5 million people in the metro Nagoya area. Nagoya is one of Japan's largest cities with a convenient public transportation system including subway, trains and buses. It is an easy, convenient city to navigate on foot, by bicycle or using public transportation, with easy access to a number of sightseeing destinations.



Cost of living in Nagoya

Living in Nagoya is less expensive than in Tokyo, the capital city of Japan. However, the cost of living in Japan can be relatively high. The current essential cost of living estimated is around ¥110,000 (Japanese yen) per month for the Nagoya area (excluding tuition and other school fees).



Housing

Newly enrolled students from abroad are generally accommodated in one of the international university residences for a maximum period of half a year, after which they may move on to other accommodations.

Generally, in Nagoya, the monthly rent for an unfurnished, one-bedroom apartment with a kitchenette, toilet, and bath ranges between 40,000 yen and 60,000 yen for a single room, depending on location, size, and amenities. A security deposit and a key-money payment, both of which are approximately two months' rent, are required for contracting. Students are usually responsible for providing their own furnishings.

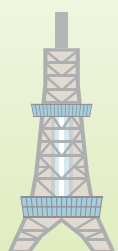
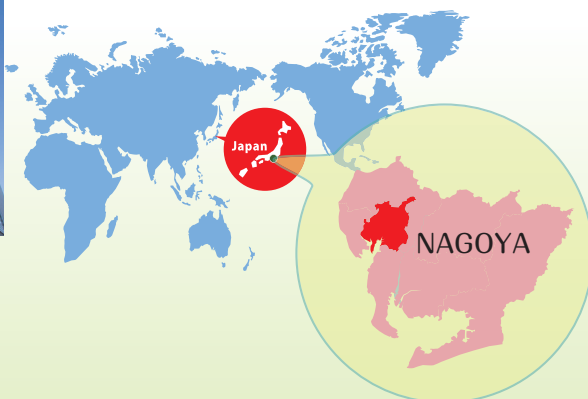
